Types 0 / 1

If there is no school tomorrow...

Conditional clauses consist of 2 parts:

IF CLAUSE (hypothesis) and MAIN CLAUSE (result)

When we start the sentence with IF we use comma before the main clause

When we start with the main sentence, no comma is needed

## **0 TYPE CONDITIONAL**

Used to express the **GENERAL TRUTH** or THE **SCIENTIFIC FACT** 

IF + PRESENT SIMPLE + PRESENT SIMPLE

If you don't brush yout teeth, you get cavities.

If we freeze water, it becomes ice.

0 conditional prevodimo sa AKO

If I \_\_\_\_\_ (wake up) late, I

\_\_\_\_\_ (be) for work.

If you \_\_\_\_\_ (mix) flour and water,

you \_\_\_\_\_ (get) glue.

## FIRST CONDITIONAL

IF + PRESENT SIMPLE + WILL

REAL SITUATIONS, LIKELY TO HAPPEN IN THE PRESENT / FUTURE

"If it rains, I won't go out"

PROMISES / OFFERS "If I finish my homework on time, I will help you with your project"

\*if + present simple + imperative = to give instructions

"If you want to attend the camp, fill in the form"

\*First conditional prevodimo sa AKO

If I \_\_\_\_\_ (have) enough money, I \_\_\_\_\_ (buy) some new shoes. **IF** + She \_\_\_\_\_(miss) the bus if she \_\_\_\_\_ (not **PRESENT** leave) soon. SIMPLE + WILL If I \_\_\_\_\_ (see) her, I \_\_\_\_\_ (tell) her. If I \_\_\_\_\_ (study) today, I \_\_\_\_\_ (go) to the party tonight.
